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Seton's Traditional Fall Play Takes a Cinematic Twist

Author and Seton teacher Timothy Heisler, writer of the Calapanta novel, declared that, "Having Seton turn it into a movie is more meaningful to me than if Hollywood did it." Everything that happens in the book and movie is straight from Mr. Heisler's imagination. "The part I like most," he said, "is that I get to act in the movie with my daughter."

The movie starts out with Jim, a young boy, having to gain courage and awaken

his powerful protector to save another dimension. He goes on a journey assisted by newfound friends to defeat a huge, evil dragon, and an army of undead soldiers.

The Calapanta movie will be acted out by students, filmed by students, and even edited by students. It will be one of the toughest undertakings Seton has done with over eighty students and adults taking part. Kids will not only have fun, but they will get a taste of real-life cinematic careers. The powerful lesson the viewer will take away from the movie is to love courageously and fearlessly.

Calapanta is scheduled for release, with a fabulous red-carpet premier, in November at the PAC at All Saints.

On July 2nd a group of high school students left the United States, in order to grow in their faith and knowledge of St. John Paul II. With open minds and wide eyes, a group of strangers climbed on a plane and took an all-night flight to Poland where they made new friends and lifelong connections.

One of the pilgrims from Seton, Marcie Van de Voorde, 11th grade, said "When I was first starting the trip I was tired, timid, and missing home," but at the end of the ten days she changed her mind, and said she was, "not ready to leave her new favorite place."



The pilgrims began their journey at a monastery founded by St. Maximillian Kolbe. On a bus the thirteen high schoolers traveled around to places like Krakow, Auschwitz, Wieliczka salt mines, Warsaw, and much more. Many were greatly affected by the pain and suffering the Polish people suffered during the Nazi regime. Patrick Wood, also in 11th grade, said, "The row after row of solemn chimneys at Auschwitz really struck me to what evil and hatred can do. It has inspired me... to live out the faith each day."

Standing in front of the Tomb of The Unknown Soldier in Warsaw, Joe the John Paul II Project team leader, told the group of students how the city had been blown to pieces during WWII. He continued to explain that the Polish people banded together in Catholic pride to rebuild their city from ruin. Afterwards the students visited museums dedicated to movements and events during the time of WWII. Many students were affected by the pride of the Polish people and how they fought the evil of the Communists through resistances like the Solidarity Movement.

St. John Paul II was also a major topic the students learned about while in Poland. This journey brought them to Wadowice, Poland to the place where Karol Józef Wojtyła was born. This location now hosts a museum dedicated to his life. There the small group of curious pilgrims had the chance to see many pictures from his life, the gun used in his assassination attempt, vestments he wore, and many other souvenirs from his life. Marcie also commented, "I realized that I'm called to be like John Paul was, in every aspect of my life."

Not only did the pilgrims learn about history and John Paul II, but also learned other important skills, especially travel skills. The pilgrims learned to take the Tram which is the form of public transportation used in Poland. Having to go ten days without phones and only one backpack taught the students the importance of detachment.

The experience of traveling to Europe with a group of friends was unique and should not be taken for granted. The students who attended definitely soaked up everything they could and grew with every moment spent in Poland. Even though this trip challenged the students intellectually, physically, and spiritually, the students answered with a resounding "YES" when asked if they would want to return to Poland and do it all again.

Tasty Tidbits One Minute Coconut Chocolate Cake in a Mug

SERVES: 1
PREP TIME: 5-10 min
COOK TIME: 1 min

INGREDIENTS

1/4 cup of flour
2 tbsp. sugar
2 1/2 tsp. of cocoa powder
1/8 tsp. of baking soda
A pinch of salt
3 tbsp. water
2 1/2 tbsp. of coconut oil
A dash of vanilla (less than 1/4 tsp.)
2 tsp. of semi-sweet chocolate chips

INSTRUCTIONS

STEP 1: Get a microwavable mug out.

STEP 2: Add all the dry ingredients and mix them together until fully combined.

STEP 3: Add the water and mix it in until the mixture sets, like a cake batter.

STEP 4: Melt the coconut oil in the microwave for about 20 seconds. Once melted, mix it into the cake mixture.

STEP 5: Add the vanilla. Stir it all together and add your chocolate chips.

STEP 6: place the mug in the microwave and cook for 1 minute.

NOTES: You can definitely add more chocolate chips if you're craving some gooey melted chocolate. If the cake does not come out as moist as you would have liked, add more coconut oil the next time you try out this recipe. **ENJOY!!!!**

Canonization of Archbishop Oscar Romero

As many are already aware, Blessed Pope Paul VI will be canonized on October 14th of this year. While he will be featured in next month's edition of the Inquisitor in greater detail, this month's issue will focus on Blessed Oscar Romero, who will also be canonized in October. He served as archbishop of San Salvador, El Salvador for three years before being fatally shot while celebrating Mass on March 24th, 1980. Tensions had been high in the country, as the poor in El Salvador were fighting for their rights in a war of counterinsurgency and the government responded by killing them. One month before his death, Romero wrote to President Carter of the United States and implored him not to supply El Salvador with military aid, as he feared that it would be used to oppress the people even further. In a sermon on March 23rd, Romero said, "In the name of God, and in the name of this suffering people whose cries rise to heaven more loudly each day, I beg you, I implore you, I order you, in the name of God, stop the repression!" Major Roberto D'Aubuisson ordered for Romero's death, and Romero was martyred during Mass on the 24th. Thousands mourned Romero's death at his funeral, where the army killed 30 and injured hundreds in the crowd. The war in El Salvador finally ended in 1992. Romero was beatified in 2015 for his martyrdom, and earlier this year a 35-year-old woman's miraculous recovery from illness was ascribed to Romero's intercession, qualifying Romero for sainthood.
