The St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Chapter of the NHS had another great year. Mrs. Lucas, faculty advisor for Seton's chapter, explains how "The National Honor Society was founded in 1921 to promote appropriate recognition for students who reflect outstanding accomplishments in the areas of scholarship, character, leadership and service." Characterized by these four essential pillars, the NHS gives young people a chance to strive for excellence in and out of school. This year marks the 100th anniversary of the founding of the NHS, marking a special year in its history. Seton's Chapter was chartered in 1976, and currently has 69 active members. 19 new members were inducted on April 14th, 2021 and 18 will graduate this June. There is usually a formal celebration for inductees with a school assembly that includes a candle-lit entrance and a guest speaker. However, due to COVID-19 restrictions, members,

inductees, and families gathered in the Queen of Angels Chapel for a smaller ceremony.

Being a part of the NHS has many benefits that students appreciate. One sophomore comments that she "joined the NHS because it looks good for college applications and it'll teach [her] responsibility and how to manage [her] time. Celebrating Our Parents

Every year, Mothers and Fathers around the world are celebrated with their own special holidays. This tradition, which gives parents a chance to relax and be spoiled by their kids, was first unofficially started in the 1860s with "Mother's Work Days". These days were set apart for mothers of Confederate and Union soldiers. However, Mother's Day was an unofficial holiday until 1914 when President Woodrow Wilson approved the second Sunday in May as a holiday to honor "that tender, gentle army, the mothers of America."

The Concept of Father's Day began in 1908 when a West Virginia church sponsored an event in honor of fathers. At first it was simply a one-time event in memory of 362 men who died in explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah. The following year, a woman named Sonora Smart Dodd successfully partnered with local churches, the YMCA, shopkeepers, and government officials to establish an official holiday. Then, on June 19th, 1910, Washington State celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day.

Over 100 years later, the tradition is still celebrated in many ways. Some children buy gifts, other children bake, and many children make homemade crafts. Here are some ways that Seton students enjoy these special holidays.

One anonymous student explains how she celebrates her parents, saying, "I write a letter every year for my mom and dad, telling them why I love them and how appreciative I am of them." Writing heartfelt letters is an awesome gift idea for all ages.

Another student shares her favorite way of celebrating Father's Day. "We spend the afternoon outside grilling burgers for dinner. Then we eat the burgers on our deck with fries and salad. I love this way to celebrate Father's Day because we eat and bond over burgers!!!", she explains.

A Beginner's Guide to Gardening

Spring has sprung and with it comes the endless yearn for the smell of fresh-picked produce and flowers upon the kitchen table. With the weather warming up and the earth once again becoming fertile, this creates the perfect time of year to begin an at-home-garden!

Here are four simple steps to create your very own garden!

- For the beginning of the gardening adventure, find a good place to plant your new biological-buds! Whether it be pots or an average plot of soil, anywhere is a good place for plant pals.
- 2. If using pots, get some good soil or fertilizer to help nourish the growth of the plants.
- 3. If using seeds, put them in a type of decomposable pot--or even eggshells-- before transferring them to the garden once they have sprouted. If using seeds, poke a hole in the dirt and drop the seed in before covering and packing it down. After this, water the plants regularly: at least four times a week.

If planting an already sprouted plant, gently take the plant out of the container, gently squeezing the bottom (if plastic) as to allow for the roots to escape easier.

4. If putting a plant into the ground, dig a hole ¼ larger than the plant and its roots. Gently place the plant in the hole before filling the remainder with dirt. Make sure to weed at least twice a week. You may need to put a net over the plants in order to protect them from birds and other wildlife.

If you closely follow these simple steps you will have a beautiful garden in no time. Have a happy and healthy summer!







Soul Surfer: The Story of Bethany Hamilton

Soul Surfer was made in 2011 and was a movie based on the autobiography Soul Surfer: A True Story of Faith, Family, and Fighting to Get Back on the Board. This movie expressed the difficulties of Bethany Hamilton, a real girl who lost her arm in a shark attack when she was only thirteen. This movie is not just about the story of Bethany and how she lost her arm, but also about her faith journey as a Christian and how her sufferings brought her closer to Christ.

The film starts off with showing videos of Bethany and her family, showing how she grew up surfing and living in the water with a voiceover explaining her early story by AnnaSophia Robb who played Bethany Hamilton. Then, it shows Bethany and her friend Alana signing up for a big surfing competition. To compete in this competition, however, Bethany had to drop out of a mission trip that she was going on, which disappointed her youth ministry leader who was played by Carrie Underwood.

After a scene of night surfing and partying that Bethany and Alana sneak off to do, the movie goes on to show the day that Bethany lost her arm. In the morning, Bethany went out on a surfing trip with her best friend, Alana, and Alana's father and brother. A shark bit off Bethany's arm along with part of her surfboard, making this trip go from fun to terrifying. She was rushed to the hospital where her father was about to have a knee surgery. Her father gave up the operating room he was in so the doctors could give the room to his daughter.

When Bethany recovered and was released from the hospital, she had to learn how to live her life again, including surfing. One month after the attack, she was determined to get back on her board. The movie showed montages of her father trying to coach her on how to surf again, but she couldn't get up onto the board. Her father created a handle to put onto her surfboard so that she had the momentum and help to bring herself up and stand on her surfboard.

Along with scenes of Bethany joining competitions again, the film also showed the mission trip that gave Bethany the motivation to continue on, despite her new struggle. She travelled to Thailand after the 2004 Indian Ocean Tsunami, bringing food and water and helping to clean up some of the leftover mess. On this trip, Bethany met a child who was terrified of the ocean after the tsunami. Bonding with this little boy, she started to teach him to touch the water and, eventually, to surf on a little makeshift board made of debris.

By helping this little boy get over his fear of the ocean, Bethany became even more determined to get on her board and win a surfing competition. The final scene of the movie takes place at the big surfing competition for which she has been training. We won't spoil the ending for you here. A reporter asked Bethany if she would undo the loss of her arm if she could and she replied, "I would still lose it because I can embrace more people now than I ever could with both."

In real life, Bethany Hamilton went on to start charities for those with traumatic limb loss while also continuing her professional surfing career. As of now, Bethany is married to youth minister, Adam Dirks, and has three sons named Tobias, Wesley, and Micah. Bethany Hamilton has inspired so many from her traumatic experience, determination, and love of God and she will continue to inspire for many more years to come!

- **13.** Two brothers, Edmond and Michel Navratil, survived the sinking without parental supervision. They were on the Titanic because their father kidnapped them from their mother to take them to America. Then when the ship was sinking, their father put them on a lifeboat and they survived.

Put This on Your "Bucket" List!

Summertime is here, the perfect time to catch some sun, get tan, and go to the beach! For this tropical season, a bucket hat would be the perfect accessory to wear on a hot summer day. This bucket hat is super simple to make and all you need is a sewing machine, thread, and fabric. It's the perfect accessory to all of your clothes and you can make it to fit your own style.

Materials

- Bucket hat template to cut the shapes of the fabric- https:// static1.squarespace.com/static/5742615bf699bb27dcd1bcef/t/5 f46cc2a51f1955e84745b74/1598475306915/Essentials+Club+-+Bucket+Hat+Template.pdf
- ½ meter of thick fabric (ex- denim and terry cloth) OR old jeans/shorts
- 3. Scissors
- 4. Sewing pins
- 5. Thread
- 6. Sewing machine

Directions

- 1. Pin the template on top of the fabric with sewing pins and cut out, following the directions with folding the fabric. You should have:
 - 1 Circle top
 - 2 Headbands
 - 4 Brims
- Sew headband panels by the short edge: Lay the sides of the headband that you want to be shown to face each other. Make sure the edges are aligned.

- 3. Attach the headband piece (the sewed pieces) to the circle top with sewing pins. Flip the headband piece inside out and attach the smaller circle of the headband piece (where the slant was \) to the circle top. For the circle top, have the side you don't want to be shown facing up.
- 4. For the brims, sew 2 brim pieces together by the long edges and with the good side facing each other. So after sewing, you should have 2 brim pieces in total. Then keep the brim flat and sew the two pieces together by the shorter edges. Then this will form one full circle brim.
- 5. To make the brim sturdy, you sew lines going around the brim with one inch margins between each line.
- Attach the brim to the headband/circle top piece. The side you don't want to be shown of both pieces should be sewn together.
- You're done! You can even add some embroidery to make your bucket hat even more unique. You can do this with sewing needle and friendship bracelet string.






A Banquet of Memories


